Turning an emerging bowl with Brian Horais – Our 2nd Quarter Woodworker's Challenge.....



Our May Demo was all about turning a project that started as a 2 piece segmented block into one that looks like a bowl emerging from that block. Brian Horais provided a step by step demonstration on how to accomplish this creative woodturning exercise. Based on an original presentation (handout distributed at the meeting) from Irwin Seidman, Brian covered a number of woodturning techniques that produced a finished art piece. Included was the use of a paper glue joint to make splitting the pieces of wood easier and the development of a simple jig to hold the pieces for hollowing and finishing.

We held our first "mentor training day" at John Jordan's shop on May 12th with Pat Brown and Stephen Wood from WVR. Photos are included below. Pat and Stephen will become the workshop mentors at WVR, allowing the students the opportunity to practice woodturning with supervision each week. An additional training day has been set for June.

Our thanks to Brian Horais for his donation of a bandsaw and a radial arm saw for the woodshop at WVR. Brian came out to the Ranch in early May to set up the bandsaw and tour the campus. We also had an anonymous donation of a sliding compound miter saw. Gordon Sloane provided a planner, a wet sharpening system and a shop vac as well as some lathe accessories and tools. All of the equipment has been delivered and set up.

We had the opportunity to participate in an interview with the Sevierville Mountain Press to talk about the AAW Educational Opportunity Grant, the Chapter and our Wears Valley Ranch educational outreach program. Brian McDonnell represented WVR in that interview. The Press published the article in a recent edition of the newspaper.

Our AAW Beads of Courage Challenge has concluded with 6 lidded vessels being added to the inventory this month. For the additional vessels, our thanks to Buddy Hewgley, Bob Brown, Greg Davis and Jake Niedling. We have 41 vessels to deliver to the AAW Symposium in Atlanta next

month. Our thanks to everyone who participated in this project. We learned that the 700+ vessels, turned by AAW Chapters from all over the country will be distributed, after the Symposium, to hospitals in Atlanta, Savannah and Macon Georgia as well as Orlando Florida.

OUR NEW LOCAL BEADS OF COURAGE PROGRAM

Our own East Tennessee Childrens Hospital in Knoxville has joined the Beads of Courage program. It's departments are currently undergoing training to begin working with the program. SMWTS, along with our sister chapter in Crossville and the East Tennessee Woodworking Guild will all be working to support the BOC program there. Drue Hogland is our program coordinator. We are asking that our members begin turning more lidded vessels for our local patients. This project has no pre-defined goals as to the number we need to produce. 

WELCOME TO MY SHOP - Chapter Member - Gordon Sloane




Gordon has been turning since 2006. When asked about his favorite projects to turn, Gordon said he loves to turn everything (bowls to pepper grinders).... He just enjoys making things out of wood. He just likes to make sawdust. Gordon also enjoys flat woodworking. He's made several of the tables and cabinets currently in use in the shop.





Gordon and his wife Jame moved to East Tennessee from Rincon, Ga in June of 2015. He retired from the US Forest Service where he was a fish biologist (naturalist). He was working out of their Charleston, SC office at that time. He even worked for Woodcraft in Charleston before relocating to TN.





Dust collection for the shop includes both a ceiling mounted air filtration system and a vacuum system permanently installed along one wall. Gordon also has a Festool orbital sanding "set-up" complete with shop vac.



When asked about his favorite finishing products for his projects, Gordon indicated that he uses a variety of oils for platters and bowls. His go-to finish for peppermills is and has been wipe on poly over sanding sealer. Gordon does some decorating with pyrography and texturing.

Here's a summary of the equipment in Gordon's shop. His primary lathe is a Powermatic (with a sandbox below the lathe bed for stabilization). He also has a Nova DVR that he can't bear to part with. Uses a Jet Mini for

pens and other small projects. He has a vacuum chuck and loves turning with it. Gordon also uses an In Line Industries

Dubby Cut-off Sled on his table saw to insure square sides on a project. I hadn't seen one of these sleds before and found out that it's available from Peachtree. I took the time to look at a YouTube video

Peachtree linked to and was amazed by its simplicity when cutting pieces of wood for segmented turning. The sled

lets a woodturner quickly cut the number of segments per circle needed (4 to 16 sides) without the hours of layout time customarily associated with this type of segmented turning. The sled adjusts for the number of sides you need. Unfortunately, the sled only works on full sized table/cabinet saws. Thanks for the tip, Gordon.























RED OAK BURL FOR SALE

We got an eMail from Dan Smith of 9003 Hillside Avenue in Mascot, TN 37806.. His phone number is <u>865-216-8199</u> Please call for an appointment to see the wood. Dan works with trees (arborist?) and said that this burl is much different than normal. The burl was in the middle of a red Oaktree that was 4 ft from side to side. The burl was cut at the ground along the flat surface in the picture. The burl itself is about 2' from side to side.. The pattern in the wood is extremely tight and swirled.
