Les Black, our June Demo Artist



At our June Meeting, Les Black from our sister chapter in Crossville presented "How to turn a rolling pin incorporating a Celtic knot". The process incorporated using a segment blank to spindle turn the French style rolling pin. Absolutely beautiful finished piece.

Les provided lots of tips and insight into how to make the project in your home shop. His primary tool for the project was a roughing gouge. The angle for the cuts to segmented dark colored wood inlays was about 13 degrees. He used Tightbond III glue. The angle cuts are all measured from the same end of the "square" blank (light wood). He allows 4 ½ to 4 ¾" for the "handles" on the ends of the rolling pin and measures the distance from the center of the Celtic knot to determine the finished size. He also allows about ½" at each end for the cut-offs.

FIRE PRECAUTIONS

- *Wood Shavings Keep the floor clean to avoid the possibility of combustion.
- *Chemicals, finishes, adhesives, paint and solvents should be kept in a steel cabinet.
- *Area around your bench grinder should be kept clean of shavings and dust.
- *Don't keep steel wool near your grinder.
- *If you use the same disc and belt sander for both wood and metal, be sure to clean them between uses.
- *Keep a fire extinguisher handy at all times.
- *Make sure you have an exit plan in place in case of a fire.







WHAT'S NEW AT THE RANCH?

Our wood turning studio at the Ranch is back in operation. With help from Jake and Randy, we re-installed the equipment, built turning tool racks and a workbench and got everything up and running just week or so ago.

While it isn't "complete" yet, we have what we need to get started. The plumbing and air conditioning aren't installed but we didn't want to wait any longer to get back to teaching. The Ranch provided a number of fans that kept us comfortable for our first week of Basic workshops on the 21st. We had five new students who enthusiastically turned their first practice project.





Our friends at Woodcraft Knoxville are working on sourcing the dust collecting

equipment the Chapter is helping to purchase. We're anticipating installing it as soon as the studio is sealed up to outside dust and dirt. Currently we are awaiting doors and interior windows that will keep out what blows into the storage area. We're still in need of a drill press for the shop. If you have a table model or a floor model in good working condition that you'd like to donate, please contact Bob Law.

The new space is awesome! More than double the size of the previous location. It was a pleasure to have room for chairs for our orientation right in the shop and each student has plenty of room for turning. Each work station has its own tool rack and equipment board right on the wall beside the lathe.

Our thanks again to all of the members who helped with the move and the subsequent re-establishment of the shop.



On a different note: The Ranch held its annual Craft Sale in the Pavilion at the Ranch this past Saturday. The kids and I manned a table that showcased the items we make in class as well as Ranch Wood Cutting Boards. We raised several hundred dollars that will go into the fund to finish the new shop.

We're proud that one of our most senior woodturning students, Will McDonnell, graduated from St. Andrews School at the Ranch and will be attending Cumberland College (University of the Cumberlands) in KY this fall.
