Over my 70 years, I've had several accidents resulting in injury and permanent damage. It wasn't that I was doing something daring or even careless. It was because I took risks without recognizing them until it was too late. It always happened as a surprise, was quick, and I couldn't get a do-over. Dick's Hoffmann's safety message at our meeting really hit me between the eyes. I've never been hurt while turning wood, but I have had plenty of things flying around and have damaged equipment. How many times? Too many. I encourage you to step back and do a careful and thorough risk assessment in your shop. It doesn't take very long, and the payoff is high. Don't turn a blind eye.

Try segmented turning as presented by Dick Hoffmann in our January meeting and submit it for Show & Tell. It'll build your skills and seeing your work will inspire other club members. Keep turning safely and challenge yourself to make something better than you ever have before.

Lathe Safety Checklist

Part 1 - Lathe Safety Rules:

Keep a balanced stance at the lathe so you do not fall or lean against the centers , workpiece, or other moving parts. Do not overreach or use excessive force to perform any machine operation.
Turn off the lathe before cleaning. Use a brush to remove chips or debris – do not use your hands.

3. It is **not necessary to lockout or unplug** the lathe when **installing chucks or mounting** the work.

4. Keep your hands clear of the faceplate or chuck. Contact with them can cause serious injuries.

5. Do not operate this machine when tired, or under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

6. Never leave the lathe when it is running. Turn the power off and do not leave the machine until it comes to a complete stop.

Part 2 - Start With A Work Area Risk Assessment:

1. A three-foot perimeter around the lathe should be kept clear of people, debris, and sawdust that might impair traction or footing to avoid slips and falls.

2. Be aware of what turners call the "red zone" or "firing zone." This is the area directly behind and in front of the workpiece, the areas most likely for a piece to travel as it comes off the lathe. A good safety habit is to step out of this zone when turning on the lathe, keeping your hand on the switch in case you need to turn the machine off. When observing someone else turn, stay out of this zone.

3. Safety glasses with side shields or a face shield and hearing protection must be worn.

4. **Dust Protection**. All sanding dust is a carcinogen, and a dust mask must be worn while sanding. Most tropical and spalted woods are irritants that can cause respiratory distress. A dust mask must be worn while turning and sanding these woods, and is recommended for all materials.

5. **Remove or fasten all loose clothing or jewelry** such as long sleeves, wristwatches and bracelets. Tie back long hair. These items might get caught by the turning and rapidly pull you into it, resulting in serious injury or death.

6. Give the work your undivided attention. Looking around or carrying on a conversation can result in serious injury or death.

7. **Do not wear loose-fitting gloves** or anything that would allow a hand, fingers or clothing to be wrapped around the revolving turning.

STEPS IN MAKING SEGMENTED BOWL

- Design
- Cutting Segments--Design ٠
- Calculate Cutting Plan: Options
 - Use purchased software such as "3D Design & Woodturner Pro" (\$79) --video in handouts
 - Use free online software such as "Marlyturned.com"
 - No Math, Pencil Method --video in SMWTS.org handouts
- **Cutting Segments--Process**
 - Set the saw angle $(15^{\circ} \text{ for } 12)$ sides)
 - Set stop at outside segment length
 - Cut # of segments needed
 - Have even # of segments so rings can be glued in halves & joint sanded flat
- **Cutting Methods**
 - Chop Saw
 - Table saw with miter angle set
 - Use a Wedgie Sled --plans in SMWTS.org handouts
- Glueing Segments into Rings--Methods
 - **Rub Joint No-Clamping**
 - Tape & Band Clamp

GLUE RINGS ON BASE


- Clamping Methods
 - Use standard clamps, gluing one ring at a time

- Use drill press with new ring on platform and chuck pressing on base
- Use lathe with base mounted to headstock. with ring pressed toward the headstock using the tailstock and flat board
- Make sure to overlap segment joints between rings

TURN & FINISH THE BOWL

- FINAL TIPS
 - If half rings have slight gaps in glue up, add a small shim in the half joints (without glue) to insure good clamping pressure on the other segments. When dry, sand each half on a flat surface.
 - When adding thin decorative rings (1/8") or less, don't make rings, just use a flat section joined and glued to a touching ring.



- When turning a deep bowl, consider glueing up • ring sections and adding them after turning the prior section. Make sure to leave a good glue surface between sections. This is turned down after the glue dries.
- Initially turn "top down", not "in" from the side of the bowl. This reduces tear out and "bounce" when turning the corners off of the initial segments to a round surface.

Show & Tell

Jake Niedlinger -- Youth Practice Bat

I made this for a friend of mine. He had one like this when his children were young--using plastic golf balls and a 1" diameter bat to help them develop good hand & eye coordination. He now has young grandkids and wanted to teach them as well. So I made him one. It is 28" long and 1" in diameter. Surprisingly, it was harder to turn than I expected. Really needed a steady rest but was able to use my hand for support while making light cuts. Finished with wipe-on poly.



Andy Milligan -- Yarn Bowl

Spalted Sycamore (I think) found-wood yarn bowl, 6" diameter by 4" tall. Wipe-on poly finish with epoxy finish for edge surface of the hook.
