#### President's Message

Forty-Four members were present at our February meeting, with eight attending on zoom, and four visitors. A pretty good turn-out for a cold February night. Jake Niedling presented another informative demonstration focusing on how to turn a hollow shape easily with the tools you already have. After a quick slide presentation of the steps he would take, he got right to the lathe for hands-on work. Not only did Jake take the audience through the project step-by-step, he slowed down many times to demonstrate a particular cut and answer questions from the audience. No one was left behind and many who participated were rewarded with poplar blanks to take back to their shops to try their own hand at turning a hollow form.

Jake tends to make wood turning look easy. With his demonstration of one-handed bowl gouge turning, it looked like magic cutting the wood. Wood turning is not magic! Lots and lots of time at the lathe correcting bad habits, learning from professionals, going to classes and practicing those techniques, helped make those cuts look easy. For many of us who started turning late, we have a long way to go. I know that I will always try to make the perfect wood bowl – it hasn't happened yet, but I keep on trying. It also means that I am still looking for that one shiny tool that will make me a better turner. At the end – "He who has the most shiny tools WINS!"

Last month I introduced you to our officers and committee chairs. These are the people who keep our monthly meetings going strong. One individual who doesn't get much attention is our secretary – Bill Thurman. Bill does the recording of our general and board meetings and is the collective memory of what we say we're going to do and when we do it. #### Quarterly Challenge - Randy Fritchman

We encourage every member to attempt to replicate each month's demonstration program idea and bring the project to our monthly Show and Tell. A random drawing will be held at the end of each quarter. The winner will receive a \$50 Woodcraft gift card. DEMO CHALLENGE for MARCH: Anything that has been split in two, hollowed, & put together,.

**Procedure:** When you bring in a Quarterly Challenge item for Show & Tell, put your name on one raffle ticket and put it in the hat. Time allowed to complete a quarterly-challenge project is 2 months from the 1st & 2nd demos of the quarter and 1 month from the 3d demo.

#### Safety Talk - Gordon Rowley

Gordon discussed the speed of the lathe and recommended that we look at one of the charts available on the Internet for determining lathe speed. He also discussed the importance of anchoring the tool on the tool rest before engaging it in the wood. He concluded with thoughts about the position of the roughing gouge, see ABC below.

	Roughing	Shaping	Sanding
Up to 2"	950	1300	2050
2"-4"	850	1150	1900
4"-6"	750	1050	1600
6"	700	750	850

#### Other recommendations:

- The tool must lay on the tool rest before it contacts the wood
- ABC = Anchor, Bevel, Cut
  - Anchor yourself, get comfortable, feet about should width apart; don't overreach
  - Bevel Put the tool on the tool rest, rub the bevel with the handle down so you're not cutting anything
  - Cut Lift the handle so the cutting edge engages the wood

The students turned bangle bracelets this month! Even with the challenges the snow days & black ice presented, our team worked through rescheduling to give everyone a chance to turn. Looking forward to Spring weather!













## Hollowing Made Easy Jake Niedling

Jake's subject was how to create a hollow object the easy way: by cutting the piece in two and hollowing both pieces. Therefore, removing the wood is easier and there is less sanding because no one will be able to feel the inside. When he put it back together, he decorated the join so that it became unnoticeable.

This demo encouraged all of us to follow this method. In fact, he stated at the beginning that everyone in the room—beginner or advanced—would be able do this project. Jake asked that, for Show & Tell, we work to complete any turned object that has been cut in half, hollowed, and put back together—vases, boxes, or even Christmas ornaments. The result may be a Quarterly Challenge winner or lots of hollow ornaments for the Fantasy of Trees. Go to it !!!

Along the way, Jake, presented slides to introduce the entire process (see his handout on our SMWTS Website, listed under Handouts & Videos; the photos & detailed instructions will help you tremendously). Along the way, He demonstrated several tools for hollowing each portion.

#### Jake's process:

- 1) Mount the blank between centers
- 2) Turn it round & put tendons on both ends of the wood blank
- 3) Draw the general shape and mark the center of the piece
- 4) Turn it to the desired shape, leaving a 1/4' flat area where the piece will be cut
- 5) Use a thin parting tool & saw to part the two pieces
- 6) Mount the top & drill a 1/2' hole all the way through; mark the thickness of the wall before hollowing
- 7) Hollow out the top half
- 8) Prep for the glue joint, making it flat & cutting a 1/8' recess
- 9) Hollow the bottom half, mark the wall thickness, sand inside to 180 grit, & cut a 1/8" tenon to fit the top. Check flatness & test fit with top half.
- 10) Glue up: Jake uses *Titebond Original* wood glue, leaves it overnight (could be a few hours) & uses the tailstock as a clamp.
- 11) When dry, give it the final shape, texture the glue Joint, and sand to 320 grit.
- 12) Final shape check, apply finish (his is 2-3 coat of homemade sanding sealer), let it dry and resand to 400 grit; follow his instructions for finishing the bottom.

VOILA! A finished hollowed creation that does not show it is really 2 pieces. Jake's sample pieces show the variety of turnings that may be created this way.
